Extended Table Communion

Recently, as you have come to the altar table to receive communion, you might have noticed several small containers sitting on the back of the table. These contain the communion elements, bread and juice, that are consecrated to be part of our new ministry, Extended Table. This ministry is a way for those who might not be able to come to church to be included in communion in their home. As the elements are prepared for worship, the containers are also prepared.



In the past several months, as we have reflected on

Extended Table and its meaning to our church community, several things are evident. First, it is so well-received by our homebound friends. Two ladies in Azalea Estates call it a "wonderful ministry." Another has invited her brother to visit her when communion is scheduled so he can receive with her. We have been given prayer requests to carry back to the church. Second, it is a joy to those who carry the elements to each friend. It gives visitors the opportunity to share with others something that is special to them.

Visits are informal, but designed to be meaningful. In conversation before we begin communion, we learn many interesting things about each other. I learned that one of our members working for the U.S. military became an Iranian national through the government of Iran in order to do her work when she and her husband were posted there. During another visit, the resident'a dog went to sleep with her head resting on my foot – a sure sign that I was welcome! We may follow folks from one residence to another, as their health dictates what they may need in terms of care. It's also been enlightening to learn family histories of many of the friends we visit. Mutual acquaintances are discovered, and old friendships are rekindled. Having time to visit someone in their home affords both parties the blessing of communion of another sort – the sharing of thoughts and feelings.

We carry not only the communion elements, but also a copy of the day's church bulletin. As we move into the communion time, we can read the scripture from the day and tell them a bit about the sermon, as well as anything interesting that happened in church that day — maybe something funny from the children's sermon or about our special music. When we begin communion, we offer it to anyone who is there. Caregivers are included, as well as roommates in a nursing home. All are welcome. We visitors also receive communion as we share it with others. After receiving communion, we close with a prayer, and the Lord's Prayer.

Right now we carry communion to ten friends each month. We have eleven who make these visits. Most visits are done on Sunday afternoon by two people who go together. If you would like to be included, either as a visitor or a recipient, please let Pastor Allyson know. We are flexible, and understand that this ministry is done as an offering, not a responsibility. That gives it the joy that is part of communion. Extended Table blesses to all who participate. Thanks be to God for this gift!



The city will not recycle cardboard, electronics, ceramics, windows, or auto glass at this event. Participants will be responsible for reusing or recycling cardboard boxes.




Love in Action new request: Clothes dryer needed
