I've always believed Christmas is all about the simple things. Sure, sometimes we go out of our way to make a grand gesture, but that's usually not what becomes the fondest of Christmas memories. Christmas is more about the small heartfelt gift than it is the giant car with a bow on it that people get in the commercials.

Christmas is probably about the simple things because it always has been. The first Christmas was the epitome of simple. Two parents and a newborn baby huddled together in the night visited by some scraggly shepherds. We think of



the angels as providing the pomp and circumstance for the first Christmas manger scene, but scripturally the angels appear to the shepherds on Christmas and there's no indication they appear again to the holy family that night. Just a simple holy night.

That also means that in terms of serving others at Christmas, the simple things are often the best ones. A number of years ago, Alli and I received an unexpected package on Christmas Eve. Christmas Eve for a clergy family is a highly stressful time, so I was elated to discover a care package set on our doorstep. Better yet, it was a small white cooler with a familiar logo emblazoned on the top. I began to salivate as I read "Omaha Steaks." Yet, when I picked it up I realized there was a problem. The address was ours, but the names weren't. Knowing that the clock was ticking with a perishable food gift I tried to do the right thing and look for any indication of how to contact the actual owner. Even though we were short on time because of Christmas Eve responsibilities, Alli called the Omaha Steaks customer service line, but of course they couldn't divulge the information of the sender for security reasons. I nearly resigned myself to the fact that we would just have to keep and eat those delicious steaks that had my stomach rumbling all afternoon.

(Harken back to my sermon a couple weeks ago) It probably would have been socially acceptable because we had genuinely tried, but it didn't feel right. I persisted with one last Hail Mary instead and searched social media for the correct owner. I found one person who kind of seemed right and sent her a message. A little time later I got a response and sure enough she was the intended owner. We exchanged a couple of more messages to cover details for her to come get the gift, but it was the last message she sent that I've never forgotten. She sent, "You know those were a gift from my grandma. It's been a really tough year for her since my grandpa passed, and she's had all kinds of health problems. She was really torn up when she realized the mistake she had made sending our gift to the wrong house. What you've just done, it'll make her Christmas."

Christmas is about the simple things. So let us show the abundant love of Christ to loved ones and strangers in simple ways.



Christmas gifts to change lives in El Salvador






There is a Christmas gift that can change a child's life forever. That gift is education. Tuition for a child to attend the Methodist School in El Salvador is just \$40 per month or \$480 per year. Two South West District mission teams are heading to El Salvador February 8-15, 2025, and February 15-22, 2025. The teams comprise 19 individuals from five different churches and are collecting money to help deserving children whose families cannot afford even this small amount. The school offers grades 1-10, the only grades that schools there have. The school helps keep the kids out of gangs, drugs, and the risk of human trafficking. The kids learn the usual subjects that we have here, including music. Their marching band has won national competitions. Many of the students are also learning English, which will open many more opportunities for good jobs. The school offers hope to the community.
